OVERVIEW

He will talk his way out of captivity, becoming instrumental in the establishment of the CIA, the state of Israel and FEMA. Years later his liberation theory and NSA 168 will be used as a justification for the invasion of Iraq.

It is probably no exaggeration to say that more than any other figure Reinhard Gehlen authored the post war world and achieved his ultimate goal of destroying the Soviet Union.

Gehlen is the fullest and most authoritative account ever written of America's collaboration with Nazi's after World War II and the long-range effects this has had on the nation's domestic and foreign policy. Drawing on extensive research and a wealth of documents previously classified, this is a sobering account of how a clandestine national security policy, embarked upon for pragmatic ends, has resulted in disastrous blowback effect that escaped the control of its authors. This has unseated those who participated in its inception and significantly contributed to the hysteria of the cold war and McCarthy era.
